

But communities are more than the essential workings. They are the museums, the parks and trails; our wonderful waterways, and our beautiful, bountiful farmland that continues to feed and nurture us through our dedicated farmers.

Our taxes only go so far so community members and organizations take on fund raising or consider legacy funding to help maintain and improve the features of our communities that so many enjoy.

In March David Armstrong and Ralph Laviolette presented a plan to Huron County council on an expanded County archives to store and preserve the recorded history of Huron County. The HCHS is seeking permission to secure a business plan and be ready when funding becomes available. We have yet to hear back from them.

The following article shows the need for repairs to the inspiring Menesetung Bridge. The Menesetung Bridge Association has also made presentations to Huron County council as well as to Town of Goderich. Still waiting to hear back. Please take a moment to read about their proposal below.

Menesetung Brídge - a County Treasure

If you like to take scenic walks, chances are you have walked across the Menesetung Bridge at Goderich. It was 34 years ago that a committed group rescued the CPR bridge from demolition and created a charitable corporation, the Menesetung Bridge Association. It was an enormous task but with determination and a lot of community support from across the county and beyond, the bridge opened as a unique trail in 1992. The Bridge Association works closely with the Matiland Trail Association and the G2G Rail Trail contributing to the extensive network of trails through Huron County and beyond.

Part of the mandate of the Bridge Association is to

maintain the bridge and to that end there is an engineering inspection done every five years. It came to light that the tops of the four piers in the water are deteriorating where the trusses rest and if left unaddressed could lead to the closure of the bridge. Keep in mind the bridge was constructed in 1907 and 1908 and the concrete has lasted 115 years. It should come as no surprise that some heavy maintenance work is needed.

Funding is going to take some creative thinking and a lot of community support. The Bridge Association met with Town of Goderich administration and the County of Huron Economic Development and tourism Departments three years ago to start working on a plan. It would involve a series of grant applications to many areas of different levels of government. Not an easy task but it was undertaken. But success was not to be had as the group had to show they had the support of local government to guarantee that sufficient funds have been committed to complete the project. The Bridge Association is not without some means and has paid for the initial engineering work. It is also willing to spearhead the community part of the project. So far the county of Huron as declined to be part of the project and the town of Goderich is still indecided. Deadline for the Bridge Association grant application was Feb. 28.

The Streamliners, The Play

Andy Sparling presented the story of the Streamliners, a little known Second World War dance band that became one of the greatest big swing bands ever produced in Canada. Its three founding members were from Goderich and Clinton. He presented to our membership last year. How time flies!

Andy teamed up with our own James White and they wrote a play about the The Streamliners. Under the direction of Duncan McGregor the play has grown


