



From the Editor

July has sneaked up on me. The calendar continues to fill up with new events. While your Historical Society is quiet during the summer months there is always something for members to enjoy in Huron.

Our own John Carter has just published **Ploughboy**, which is being launched later this month (Details to the left). Readers may recall that John is a very dedicated contributor to the Huron Historical Notes and is the Peninsula Director for the Bruce County Historical Society. Busy guy!

The Community of St. Columban and hamlet members from afar have been working hard to raise funds and craft the wording for a plaque of recognition of the first church and school built in McKillop Township. It was considered one of the building blocks in the opening of the Huron Tract.

The first missionary priest in the area, Rev. Thomas Gibney of Guelph visited periodically and preached in settler's homes before the first church was built. It was a log building located at Irishtown between Seaforth and Dublin on the north side of the Huron Road.

The second church, a wonderful white brick, was built in 1879 but was destroyed by fire in 1909. The next one was an imposing red brick built 1910-11 and designed by James S. Russell of Stratford. It was dedicated May 25, 1911. By this time the village was no longer called Irishtown but St. Columban. The parish struggled during the last years of the last century and it was slated for closure in June 2005. The community debated over demolition or designation. In the end the building was taken down.

On treasures found;- John Scott of Seaforth shared with us photos of unique wooden items that maybe members can confirm their purpose.

John is a descendent of James Scott and his wife Isabella Dickson who were among the earliest settlers in Roxboro, located at the junction of what is now Hydro Line Road and the Roxboro Line in McKillop Township northwest of the Seaforth. The Scotts saw a need for a gristmill and in the 1840s James Scott set about damming the Maitland River just upstream of the bridge to power his mill. The mill was later converted to steam before closing in 1880.

The items John has were stored in the family home for generations, now owned by James' great-grandson Ken Scott and known as Maitland Wells Farm on the west side of the Roxboro Line just south of the Roxboro Bridge. He feels they may have been used in stamping the mill's name on flour bags.









The top two items are approximately one foot long. The next carving is much smaller and the third object is about a foot long as well.

The last item appears to be molded metal. All were stored together which may indicate they were used in conjunction with each other. Maybe? If you have any ideas on the use of the above items please drop an email to HCHS and we will pass them along to John

John has also been consumed with finding out who was on the boat that brought the original James Scott and Isabella Dickson family to Canada. For those family history hunters, we know this is just the tip of the iceberg for him.

Back row, standing, Margaret (Maggie) Scott #2, 31 years old, Mrs. Samuel Carnochan married in 1878; Archibald Dickson (Archie) Scott #7, 19 years old, will marry Anne Elizabeth Ross in 1891; and Ellen Dickson Scott #5, 24 years old and will marry John McLean Wilson in 1890

Seated: Janet (Jessie) Scott #4, 27 years old, Mrs James Grieve married in 1875; Elizabeth (Lizzie) Rutherford Scott #3, 28 years old, will remain single; Joseph John (Joe) Scott #9, 13 years old, will marry Isabella Carnochan in 1898; James Robert (JR) Scott #8, 14 years old, will marry Harriet Campbell in 1893 and Marion Muldrew in 1898; Isabella Turnbull (Bella) Scott #1, 34 years old will remain single; and Agnes Scott #6, 21 years old, will marry John Govenlock Wilson in 1883
