This summer we learned of the valuable contribution of young women who headed to the farmlands during the war years responding to "We Can't Fight If We Don't Eat". A record turnout for *Onion Skins and Peach Fuzz* written for Blyth Festival by Allison Lawrence, inspired by the book by our own Bonnie Sitter and Shirleyan English. It captured the untold stories of the young women and their excitment, pain and joy of growing up during the war years away from family. #### Life Members

Your Society accepted two new life members at their May meeting. These are community historians who have furthered the love and interest in Huron history.

Mac Campbell grew up in Goderich and has been always fascinated by his community especially all the rail connections and the development of the harbour and what makes it all tick. Mac captured many moments on film and was part of a small group to spearhead the publishing of the book *Goderich Jubilee 3 - 1827-1977*, *Memories of Goderich*. He is a mover and a shaker and reminds us of the stories of our past. Mac sat on the Bridging the Gap campaign to save the Menesetung Bridge we all enjoy today; a member of the Municipal and Marine Heritage Committee; a Lifetime Member of the Rotary Club and has been a well received speaker on a variety of local historical topics. David Armstrong, an active community historian, has been part of an ad hoc committee (Chair) to address the need for greater and improved county archives. While the project started a number of years ago, the need is even more pressing in light of personal collections that are not being either retained or stored properly. This spring, David and Ralph Laviolette presented their report to Huron County Council in a bid to get their support to proceed with a business plan to take us positivity into the future. The return to Historical Society sponsored bus trips was initiated by David who not only takes your names and menu choices but plots out the trip and venues we will visit. No small feat. I am honoured to have called Ted Turner a friend. He was a warm, clever man who, among other talents, researched issues and topics thoroughly. And we still enjoy his labours of love.

Harold Edward 'Ted' Turner passed suddenly June 7, 2024. He was born in Clinton and raised in Goderich where he attended both public and high school and later graduated from the University of Western Ontario with a B.Sc in math and physics as well as a Ph.D in atmospheric science. He worked as a researcher and a research manager with the Toronto office of Environment Canada, retiring to Goderich in 1994. His greatest joy was being actively involved with local community bands, primarily playing the trumpet. Band, and the Goderich Foghorns. He was a busy guy! Ted also volunteered at the Huron County Museum and spent hours pouring over military badges and you can see the results of his hours of work still on display at the Huron County Museum. He also worked in the archives bringing order to valuable papers. Ted was the main researcher behind the 1996 Historical Notes Place and Post Office Names in Huron County, still in print and available. A great research tool. He was a Life Member of the Historical Society. I got to know Ted better when he and John Hazlitt were researching their book Power of the Maitland. John knew the lay of the land, but Ted researched the history and together they made a remarkable team. I had the joy of tramping around the Maitland river looking for head and tail races of long gone mill sites. It was both invigorating and educational too. All the work our ancestors went to wrestling a life out of the wilderness, some spots were merely hints of the massive work needed to bring power to the new communities.

Our Society, indeed, our greater community, is richer for knowing Ted Turner, community historian.
